The Book of Romans as a Treatise on Justice

The theme of justice pervades the Bible from Genesis to Revelation. And all Christians agree that justice is important. We often disagree, however, about what justice *means*, both in Scripture and for us today. Readers frequently miss a key source, a writing in which justice is actually the central concern: the book of Romans.

In *Resurrecting Justice*, theologian Douglas Harink invites readers to rediscover Romans as a treatise on justice. He traces Paul's thinking on this theme through a sequential reading of the book, finding in each passage facets of the gospel's primary claim—that God accomplishes justice in the death and resurrection of Jesus Messiah. By rendering forms of the Greek word *dikaiosynē* as "just" or "justice," Harink emphasizes the inseparability of personal, social, and political uprightness that was clear to Paul but is obscured in modern translations' use of the words "righteous" and "righteouss" instead.

Harink includes personal reflection questions and contemporary implications, helping readers connect Paul's teaching to issues in their world such as church life, politics, power, criminal justice, and violence. In Romans the life, death, resurrection, and exaltation of Jesus makes all the difference in how we think about justice.



The Catholic Epistles in Canonical Context

The Catholic Epistles often get short shrift. Tucked into a few pages near the back of our Bibles, these books are sometimes referred to as the "non-Pauline epistles" or "concluding letters," maybe getting lumped together with Hebrews and Revelation. Yet these letters, Darian Lockett argues, are treasures hidden in plain sight, and it's time to give them the attention they deserve.

In *Letters for the Church*, Lockett reveals how the Catholic Epistles provide a unique window into early Christian theology and practice. Based on evidence from the early church, he contends that the seven letters of James, 1–2 Peter, 1–3 John, and Jude were accepted into the canon as a collection and should be read together. Lockett introduces the context and content of the Catholic Epistles while emphasizing how all seven letters are connected. Each chapter outlines the author, audience, and genre of one of the epistles, traces its flow of thought, and explores shared themes with the other Catholic Epistles.

The early church valued the Catholic Epistles for multiple reasons: they defend orthodox faith and morals against the challenges of heretics, make clear that Christianity combines belief with action, and round out the New Testament witness to Christian faith and life. By introducing the coherent vision of these seven epistles, *Letters for the Church* helps us rediscover these riches.

A Spirit-Centered Introduction to the New Testament

In the early church, miraculous workings of the Holy Spirit were normal and normative. Today an ever-increasing number of Christians worldwide self-identify as Pentecostal or charismatic. William A. Simmons argues that this means the church needs a Spirit-centered interpretation of Scripture informed by a Pentecostal lens.

In *The Holy Spirit in the New Testament,* Simmons provides an accessible New Testament introduction that discusses themes and passages of particular interest to Pentecostal readers. Each chapter explores the presence of the Spirit in a biblical book, then offers devotional applications to help readers respond to the text. In Matthew, for example, we discover that there is no Messianic era apart from the Spirit. For Paul in Romans, the Holy Spirit is the authenticating power and emotive heart of God. And Revelation is permeated with the illuminating voice of the Spirit from beginning to end.

A Spirit-centered reading breaks down divisions between reason and spirit, mind and emotion. This book opens a dialogue between the academy and the church, demonstrating how sound exegesis speaks to Spirit-filled Christians. In the world and writings of the New Testament authors, we continue to encounter the revelatory presence of God.




A LOOK INSIDE

The devotional intent of the New Testament must be part of a Spirit-centered study of the Bible. Yet historic and linguistic elements are part of the Spirit's work as well. Furthermore, an approach that appropriates the self-same Spirit that inspired the New Testament in the first place, is an approach that expects the text to be believed and obeyed. Therefore, what Craig Keener calls an "epistemic commitment" to the claims of Scripture and to the living voice of the Spirit must be a priori assumptions for any Spirit-filled hermeneutic. It is this very assumption that guides and shapes every chapter of this book.



WILLIAM A. SIMMONS (PhD, University of St. Andrews) is a professor of New Testament and Greek at Lee University, where he teaches graduate and undergraduate classes in the areas of Pauline studies and Koine Greek. He is the author of several books including *Peoples of the New Testament World, A Pentecostal Approach to Bible Study: Leader's Guide,* and Bible studies on James, Ephesians, and Philippians.

Christology in the Book of Hebrews

What does the epistle to the Hebrews mean when it calls Jesus "Son"? Is "Son" a title that denotes his eternal existence as one person of the Trinity? Or is it a title Jesus receives upon his installation on heaven's throne after his resurrection and ascension?

In this Studies in Christian Doctrine and Scripture (SCDS) volume, which promotes fresh understandings of Christian belief through creative, faithful readings of the canonical text, pastor and New Testament scholar R. B. Jamieson probes the complexity of the Christology presented in the epistle to the Hebrews.

And although Julian's Pelagianism does not fundamentally affect the commentaries presented in this volume, Christians can gain insight into the truths of Scripture by reading the text alongside others, even when—or perhaps especially when—we might disagree with other aspects of their beliefs.





A Quick Introduction to Church History

The history of the Christian church is a fascinating story. Our Seven Sentences series offers readers brief introductions to entire disciplines by exploring seven representative sentences. How did you come up with your sentences for Christian history?

TAIT: It was very difficult to select from the hundreds if not thousands of possibilities! Since there is also a book planned in the series

called *Theology in Seven Sentences*, I was encouraged to consider sentences from documents that had significantly shaped the historical context of the church. This led me in the direction of creeds, councils, edicts, and proclamations. I also wanted a good balance of sentences from all eras of the church, so I ended up with two early church sentences, two medieval ones, an early modern one, and two from the modern era.

Why should Christians today concern themselves with the history of the church, which is so often removed from us by time, culture, language, and more? What can we hope to learn from earlier Christians?

TAIT: I've taught church history as an affiliate professor at Asbury Theological Seminary. I often tell my students that they should think of figures in church history not as names and dates to memorize but as brothers and sisters in Christ who just happen to be with Jesus now. From them, we can learn how to wrestle with difficult questions, spread the Gospel, and be faithful disciples of Christ. Sometimes (for example, the Crusades, the burning of heretics, the German state church during Nazism), we learn this from looking at them and deciding not to do what they did.

I'm particularly inspired in this by G. K. Chesterton, who once said—I quote him in the book, in fact—that "tradition means giving a vote to the most obscure of all classes, our ancestors." I look at church history as inviting them into the conversation.

I'll give you the chance to mention a couple of the other sentences that you might have chosen for the book. What else do you wish you could have included?

TAIT: My favorite piece of writing in the entire history of the Christian church is Athanasius's *On the Incarnation*, especially its central affirmation: "Christ was made man that we might be made God." I urge you to go read the whole thing right now—I'll wait. Try to find the version with the introduction by C. S. Lewis (which is also one of my favorite pieces of Christian writing).

As an Anglican, I also wish I could have used the collect for the first Sunday of Advent from the *Book of Common Prayer*: "Almighty God,


give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness, and put upon us the armor of light, now in the time of this mortal life in which thy Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the quick and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, now and forever. Amen." (Yes, that's a very long sentence.)

Finally, as someone from a Wesleyan-

Arminian background, I would love to have included John Wesley's famous report of his experience at Aldersgate: "I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

In addition to serving as the managing editor of *Christian History* magazine, you are an ordained priest in the Episcopal Church. How does knowing church history inform your ministry?

TAIT: One of my mentors, Mthr. Margaret Shanks, said once as she was training acolytes, "Every mistake that can be made in the church has been made, and Christ is still worshipped." Knowing church history helps me remember that, and it's a heartening thought. When I preach and when I lead Christian education and formation, a knowledge of church history also helps me give context as to how the Bible has been interpreted through the centuries.

Completing the Reformation Commentary on John's Gospel

After he had washed the disciples' feet, Jesus said, "Just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another." The second half of the Gospel of John, sometimes called the most "theological" of the Gospels, includes John's account of Jesus' final night with his disciples, his betrayal and arrest, his crucifixion, his resurrection, and his appearances to his disciples.

When the Reformers of the sixteenth century turned to the fourth Gospel, they found a multitude of theological treasures: a clear affirmation of the full divinity of Christ; insights into the relationships among the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; and guidance for the church in their time. For example, John Calvin claimed, "This Gospel is a key to open the door for understanding the rest; for whoever shall understand the power of Christ, as it is here strikingly portrayed, will afterwards read with advantage what the others relate about the Redeemer who was manifested."

In this volume of the Reformation Commentary on Scripture, church historian Christopher Boyd Brown guides readers through a diversity of early modern commentary on chapters 13–21 of the Gospel of John. Readers will hear from familiar voices and discover lesser-known figures from a range of theological traditions, including Lutherans, Reformed, Radicals, Anglicans, and Roman Catholics.

How Is Our News Consumption Forming Us?

Whenever we reach for our phones or scan a newspaper to get "caught up," we are being not merely informed but also formed. News consumption can shape our sense of belonging, how we judge the value of our lives, and even how our brains function. 



Excerpt from Chapter 1: "On Being a Christian Public Intellectual"

For centuries, the social world was relatively simple—"social world" designating here the world of economy, politics, technology, and communication, along with the impact of these on the environment; what we can describe . . . as the combined effect of human poiesis and praxis. Today changes are far reaching and their pace breathtaking. The social world is exceedingly complex, with major transformations often happening under the surface, inaccessible to immediate observation. To identify and track the changes requires careful

study. Public intellectuals do important work in helping the larger population understand the dynamics of change and its implications for human life.

In a complex and fast-changing world, we also need help with identifying the best ways to achieve goals that concern the common good. The tools we must use to find our way in the world and make the world serviceable to our needs are understandably highly complex as well, tracking in complexity the social world in which they are put to use. The introduction of new materials and new technologies has potential for both help and harm; some solutions are less costly than others, and so forth. If we are to adopt new technologies responsibly, we need public intellectuals to help us discern the effects of technologies on our individual lives, on communities, and on major institutions.

In the two tasks mentioned—understanding the world and designing and deploying technologies (which have to do, respectively, with explanatory and instrumental rationality)—the work of Christian public intellectuals will largely overlap with the work of public intellectuals of any other religious or secular orientation. Between these two tasks lies the third, which concerns human purposes. At the heart of the Christian faith and Christian thinking about social issues is concern for the fundamental orientation in life, for the kind of life, individual and social, that is truly worthy of our humanity. This is not in the first instance a question of morality, about how we should behave, though moral questions are included in it; this is above all a question of human ontology, about who we are, about how we are set in the story of everything, and about the goal toward which we ought to stretch ourselves.

To put the matter in the vocabulary of St. Augustine, Christian faith, and therefore Christian public engagement, is about what we should ultimately trust and what we should love above all things (and what we should, therefore, deeply mistrust and struggle against); it is about how we should live, as individuals, communities, and the entire human family, in the light of that trust and love.

What motivated you to take on this project? Was there a specific circumstance or event that inspired the book?

COLLIER-GOUBIL: I became a mom while in a full-time faculty position. In Christian higher education, our environments are very family friendly, but navigating new parenthood is still daunting. I wished there was a resource that spoke to my unique circumstances.

YUEN: I want to give voice to and provide a resource for others struggling to balance motherhood, the academy, and faith.

What are some challenges that Christian mothers in the academy face that seem different from challenges that perhaps all or the vast majority of academic mothers face?

COLLIER-GOUBIL: At times a person's religious beliefs can prevent them from seeking assistance and discussing things we do not often discuss in the church, such as infertility and child loss, or when a faculty

mom is the head of her household. A Christian woman experiencing infertility has to consider not only the personal and medical repercussions of her decisions but also the social and professional. Similarly, a faculty mom who is head of household has to navigate the historical territory of the church that calls for male leadership in all areas and aspects of life (depending on faith background). Being a pastor, faculty, or mom, including a mom dealing with depression, or a mom of an exceptional child—these are areas that we fail to openly discuss in many churches, so where do we leave a faculty mama to turn for assistance? As you gathered stories and worked with contributors, what is one thing you learned (or a highlight of that process)?

COLLIER-GOUBIL: I have been so inspired by the creativity, resilience, and brilliance of our contributing authors. They have navigated rough terrain and still show up in class perfectly assembled, carrying grace and mercy for students, and with a lesson plan ready to go! Then a few hours later, they become a problem solver in chief, assisting their littles to navigate all sorts of issues that life throws their way. They truly are power women!

YUEN: I learned from the contributors to conceptualize motherhood, the academy, and faith not as different spheres vying for our attention but synergistic assets.

We're in the middle of a pandemic. Would you be willing to speak to the effects of this crisis on academic mothers in general or those you know personally?

COLLIER-GOUBIL: The moms I know personally are struggling. This pandemic has definitely affected all in a remarkable way. Faculty moms are burning the candle at both ends, so to speak, and trying to avoid burnout. It's a tough time for us all.

YUEN: Professor mothers who have to supervise or homeschool their children because of school and daycare closures are having a hard time finding work-life balance. At the same time, they also savor the slowing down of time with their children and families.

What is one message you hope readers take away from your book?

COLLIER-GOUBIL: We hope that readers find themselves, their colleagues, and faculty they supervise in our book. We hope that the stories of these powerful and faith-filled women will motivate us all to aspire to a higher-ed workspace that is more inclusive of the myriad pressures experienced by faculty moms.





Your previous book, *From Topic to Thesis*, remains popular with readers, so it makes sense to have a follow up to that one. Why did you decide to focus on the transition from graduate school to teaching for your next book?

KIBBE: My father was a high school math teacher, and a good one. I mean, he could not only get from A (problem) to B (solution); he could show you how he did so, step by concrete step, and teach you to do likewise.

So I suppose I'm drawn to situations in which we are given "A" and "B" but not necessarily shown how to get from one to the other. The movement from graduate school to teaching is definitely one of those situations! There's also some autobiography in all this: I moved from the church to the library (and had to learn how to research), and then I moved from the library to the classroom (and had to learn how to teach).

You've been teaching for several years, but it's probably still pretty fresh as well. How does your current stage (not exactly new but not yet a teaching legend) help you author this book?

KIBBE: Most books on teaching are written by the legends, and that's a good thing! But the early years of teaching are like the early years of parenting: for some things you need grandma (the "legend") and for others you need some friends who are right alongside you or maybe just a few steps ahead. That's where I come in! This is year seven for me, which means—to follow the parenting analogy—I am no longer up at all hours of the night wondering how in the world I'm going to get this kid to fall asleep, but I still remember that stage quite clearly. My hope in this book is to be that friend who remembers those early years of teaching well enough to be a helpful dialogue partner for those still navigating them.

What was the most unexpected challenge for you personally as you made the transition to teaching after grad school?

KIBBE: Writing a dissertation is 90% perseverance—just keep going, keep digging, keep stubbornly insisting that you haven't yet gotten to the bottom of things, and eventually you will do precisely that. Five thousand hours of work to prepare for a two-hour dissertation defense. All of a sudden I had forty-five minutes to prepare for a ninety minute class session, and not just once, but several times per week for the next four months. Rinse, repeat. It's like going from ultrarunning to Crossfit.

Tell us about the structure of the book. How would you describe the two sections and what they include?

KIBBE: The book is intentionally—and, for an academic, somewhat counterintuitively—structured around what teachers must do (first) and what they must know (second). Putting doing before knowing reminds us that teaching is a skill, and you can't theorize your way into a skill. You have to go do it, and then, as you do it—and reflect on what you did—you'll come to know the things that will enable you to go back and do it again.


You have a chapter of the book about the power of professors. Why is power an important concept to keep in mind as professors lean into teaching?

KIBBE: Every year, from (roughly) July to October, my family in California lives under the threat of forest fires. Our students, likewise, live every day in the classroom under similar circumstances. The apostle James tells

us that the tongue is a deadly flame, and we who speak for a living must never forget the power we possess. Power to do incredible good, power to do inestimable evil. And since the best teachers can do the most damage, because their words have the most power, the invitation to great pedagogy is simultaneously an invitation to great caution.

What is your hope for readers of your book?

KIBBE: Intentionality is the irreducible minimum of great teaching. As I continue to grow as a teacher, I have this one hope above all: that I move closer and closer to doing everything on purpose. Everything from the fundamental course outcomes to the font size on the handout, from an assigned reading to the intonation with which I cite a specific phrase from it. This book is an invitation to others to join me on that journey—to think more deeply about why we teach the way we do, at every level.

This book is about one attempt to restore the discipline's larger mission.

There are vital roles to be played by archetypal challenges such as those involving self-control, guilt, and grit, and even the terror of death enters into positive psychology's vision of human flourishing.

Charles Hackney connects this still-new movement to foundational concepts in philosophy and Christian theology. He then explores topics such as subjective states, cognitive processes, and the roles of personality, relationships, and environment, also considering relevant practices in spheres from the workplace to the church and even the martial arts dojo. Hackney takes seriously the range of critiques positive psychology has faced as he frames a constructive future for Christian contributions to the field.
