Expanding Our Understanding of Spiritual Formation

What led to your interest in spiritual formation and now sharing about spiritual formation and the global church?

Ryan A. Brandt and John Frederick: In recent decades, the world has undoubtedly grown closer and smaller, becoming a global village through the advent and proliferation of communication technology and the internet. Yet, despite these advances, evangelicals often remain fixed and focused on theological conversations and practices that take place within narrow regional, national, denominational, and racial/ethnic boundaries.

We are addressing the need to do theology and Christian discipleship in a way that is broader and open to the wisdom and practices of the manifold streams of the global church, which can speak with authority, conviction, and transformative power when we combine the riches of our various streams of historic, orthodox, evangelical Christianity into a coherent chorus of transformative global constructive theology. In our book, the reader is invited to engage with the voices of theologians and practitioners, men and women from every tribe, tongue, nation, and stream of the evangelical church. The reader will be immersed in the full breadth of the wisdom of the contemporary church throughout the world by encountering indigenous theological formulations and practices representing the church in its African, Asian, Latin American, North American, and European contexts and cultures.

What is your main thesis in Spiritual Formation for the Global Church?

Brandt and Frederick: Our book is a global, multidenominational, multiethnic effort in which evangelical biblical scholars, theologians, and practitioners from around the world join together to represent the one body of Christ in pursuit of a cohesive, yet diverse, constructive theology and praxis of spiritual formation for the global church in the twenty-first century.

This book engages with evangelical voices from different cultures to help one another chart spiritual courses away from dangerous dichotomous paths that separate the heart from the head in the pursuit of spiritual growth and toward conformity with Christ. The book invites you to examine yourself through the various cultural and theological lenses provided, and to do so in a prayerful manner, asking—and indeed expecting—God to illuminate your own cultural and theological assumptions and spiritual blind spots in order that you might be blessed by the voices of the global communion of the saints.

What do you hope your book contributes to the study of spiritual formation?

Brandt and Frederick:

 The volume represents the latest, cutting-edge original research on the theology and practice of spiritual formation from leading biblical and theological scholars from Pentecostal, Anglican, Reformed, Wesleyan, Barthian, Baptist, Presbyterian, Lutheran, Anabaptist, and nondenominational streams of the evangelical church.









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

- Our book brings together a broader array of voices from a very diverse, global perspective (including the
 Pentecostal, Anglican, Presbyterian, Lutheran, and evangelical perspectives) and focuses on spiritual formation in
 general from these different perspectives. In other words, our book proposes to ask what spiritual formation looks
 like for a Latin Pentecostal, African Anglican, or Eastern European Baptist. In this sense, our book is interested in a
 global contextual cohesive theology of spiritual formation meant for the benefit of the global church. There is not
 another book that does this in this way.
- The book provides a single-volume, affordable, global, evangelical resource that can function as a course text at the graduate and undergraduate level. It functions well as a text that can be easily bundled with other shorter texts to form a suite of spiritual formation resources for a college or seminary course. In particular, our book offers a contemporary evangelical perspective that incorporates voices of the global church in a constructive and collaborative theology on the topic of spiritual formation. Thus, it can be marketed as a course text alongside other devotional primary sources on spiritual formation—texts that listen to the voices of the saints through the ages—alongside the voices of the saints from across the globe in our book. Our book achieves this by situating the student in an example of global listening that spans ethnic, cultural, and denominational boundaries by organizing all of these distinct charisms and perspectives under the broad tent of the evangelical stream of the historic Christian faith.


