

Paul D. Miller (PhD, Georgetown University) is Professor of the Practice of International Affairs at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service and co-chair of the Global Politics and Security concentration. He spent a decade in public service as director for Afghanistan and Pakistan on the National Security Council staff, an intelligence analyst for the Central Intelligence Agency, and a military intelligence officer in the US Army.

Disentangling Christian Nationalism from Biblical Christianity

As someone who has worked in various public service roles, from the National Security Council to the CIA to the United States Army, what prompted you at this time to write a book about Christian nationalism?

Paul D. Miller: I started writing this book in the spring of 2016 when I realized I no longer understood what was happening in politically and religiously conservative circles. It was clear to me that there were cultural forces at work that I had overlooked—cultural forces that I came to recognize as nationalism. I was especially bothered to see the way nationalism spoke "Christian" language and sold itself as a "Christian" phenomenon. I saw a glaring need to disentangle nationalism from biblical Christianity, to isolate nationalism and show how it manipulates Christian language, and to help Christians protect themselves.

How does your work as a professor and scholar speak to this particular book?

Miller: I am a scholar of ordered liberty at home and abroad. My previous three books examine ordered liberty abroad, in US foreign policy and America's role in the world. *The Religion of American Greatness* turns homeward and examines one of the chief challenges to ordered liberty in the United States.

There has been a lot of talk about nationalism recently. What is unique about your approach in *The Religion of American Greatness*?

Miller: I take Christian nationalism seriously as a political theory and engage with its ideas, rather than drawing a caricature or dismissing it out of hand as some critics and journalistic accounts do. I approach the subject from within American conservatism and American evangelicalism, as opposed to many of the critiques that come from outsiders. Mine is also a multidisciplinary study, integrating a large amount of scholarship from political science, political theory, sociology, history, and theology.

What are the top contributions your book makes to the scholarly community?

Miller:

- I develop a scholarly definition of Christian nationalism, drawn from an extensive review of the literature on nationalism and the history of nationalism in America.
- I develop a multidisciplinary critique of Christian nationalism, drawing from political theory, history, and theology.
- I apply my critique to current events, showing how Christian nationalism influenced the agenda of the Christian Right and led most self-identified White evangelicals to support Donald Trump.
- I develop an alternate, positive understanding of healthy nationality and Christian patriotism.

Dr. Paul D. Miller is a scholar and public servant devoted to ordered liberty at home and abroad.

In his academic work, Dr. Miller is a political theorist and political scientist focusing on international affairs, the American experiment, and America's role in the world. Previously, he spent a decade in public service as director for Afghanistan and Pakistan on the National Security Council staff, an intelligence analyst for the Central Intelligence Agency, and a military intelligence officer in the US Army.

He is currently a professor of the practice of international affairs at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. He serves as co-chair of the global politics and security concentration in the Master of Science in Foreign Service program. He is also a research fellow with the Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission, a visiting professor with the American Enterprise Institute's Initiative on Faith and Public Life, and a non-resident senior fellow with the Atlantic Council's Scowcroft Center for Strategy and Security.

Dr. Miller writes widely on international affairs, political theory, religion and public life, and film and culture. His most recent book is *The Religion of American Greatness: What's Wrong with Christian Nationalism* (IVP Academic, 2022). He is also the author of *Just War and Ordered Liberty* (Cambridge University Press, 2021), *American Power and Liberal Order* (Georgetown University Press, 2016), and *Armed State Building* (Cornell University Press, 2013).

Dr. Miller has authored scores of scholarly articles, essays, book reviews, reports, and op-eds, and hundreds of blog posts. His writing has appeared in Foreign Affairs, the Washington Post, Providence Magazine, The New Republic, Mere Orthodoxy, The Gospel Coalition, Foreign Policy, Survival, Presidential Studies Quarterly, the Journal of Strategic Studies, Orbis, The American Interest, The National Interest, World Affairs, Small Wars & Insurgencies, and elsewhere. Miller taught at the University of Texas at Austin and the National Defense University, and worked at the RAND Corporation prior to his arrival at Georgetown. He holds a PhD in international relations and a BA in government from Georgetown University, and a master's in public policy from Harvard University. He is a contributing editor of *Providence: A Journal of Christianity and American Foreign Policy*.

He lives in Virginia with his wife, Jennilee, and three children.
