Numerous scholars have explored what the Septuagint is and its history and uses, but less scholarship has engaged with the ways it exercises authority within the Christian tradition. In the first multicontributor volume of its kind, biblical scholars Greg Lanier and Will Ross bring together experts from a variety of disciplines to explore the nature of the Septuagint's authority over the ages.

The Meaning of the Septuagint for the Church Today

Levi Berntson (PhD, University of Aberdeen) is associate professor of theology at Reformation Bible College and a specialist in the early and middle Dutch Reformation period and theological prolegomena.

J. V. Fesko (PhD, University of Aberdeen) is the Harriet Barbour Professor of Systematic and Historical Theology at Reformed Theological Seminary (Jackson) and author of numerous books on the Trinity, systematic theology, and other topics.

Edmon L. Gallagher (PhD, Hebrew Union College, Jewish Institute of Religion) is professor of Christian Scripture at Heritage Christian University and author of *The Translation of the Seventy* (ACU Press), *The Biblical Canon Lists from Early Christianity* (Oxford), and other books on the Septuagint and church fathers.

Karen Jobes (PhD, Westminster Theological Seminary) is professor emerita of New Testament Greek and Greek Exegesis at Wheaton College and has written extensively on the Septuagint and the General Epistles.

Thomas Keene (PhD, Westminster Theological Seminary) is professor of New Testament and academic dean at Reformed Theological Seminary (Washington, DC) and has authored various articles and essays on hermeneutics, Luke-Acts, and Hebrews.

Gregory R. Lanier (PhD, University of Cambridge) is professor of New Testament at Reformed Theological Seminary (Orlando) and author of *Apocryphal Prophets and Athenian Poets: Noncanonical Influences on the New Testament* (B&H), *Corpus Christologicum* (Hendrickson), and other books and articles.

Joshua McQuaid (PhD candidate, Wheaton College) is a specialist in systematic theology, particularly the works of Herman Bavinck.

James B. Prothro (PhD, University of Cambridge) is assistant professor of Scripture and theology at the Augustine Institute and has written multiple books on Paul and journal articles on the doctrine of Scripture.

William A. Ross (PhD, University of Cambridge) is associate professor of Old Testament at Reformed Theological Seminary (Charlotte) and author/editor of *T&T Clark Handbook of Septuagint Research* (Bloomsbury), *Postclassical Greek and Septuagint Lexicography* (SBL Press), and several other books and articles.

Myrto Theocharous (PhD, University of Cambridge) is academic dean and professor of Hebrew and Old Testament at the Greek Bible College in Athens, Greece, and author of multiple books and articles dealing with the Septuagint.

Daniel Treier (PhD, Trinity Evangelical Divinity School) is the Gunther H. Knoedler Professor of Theology at Wheaton College and author of various books on systematic theology, the doctrine of Scripture, Proverbs, and Ecclesiastes.
